Condition Name	Drift Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with little to no noticeable scratches or use. Normally commands the highest cost.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Minor acnes, slight scratches, or minor paint chipping, often only visible upon close assessment.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Substantial wear, heavy scratches, and notable paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Exceptionally worn, heavily faded, and often considerably modified look. Some collectors particularly seek out extreme BS drifts for a "blackimov" result.

Beyond basic wear, some skins likewise feature a **StatTrak™** innovation module, which tracks the number of eliminates a player gets with that specific weapon, including a glowing orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic products in lots of other modern-day video games, CS2 skins possess real-world financial worth because they are totally tradeable and valuable. Gamers can buy, offer, and trade items via the Steam Community

Market or through trustworthy third-party markets using genuine currency or cryptocurrencies.
