

Fort Salonga sits in that interesting stretch of Long Island where old stories and everyday suburban life keep meeting each other. It is not a place that announces itself with skyscrapers or a dense downtown core. Instead, its character has been built slowly, through shoreline living, wooded roads, family routines, and the steady rhythm of people who chose to stay.
