This single upgrade triggered a huge shockwave in the trading neighborhood, completely separating "investable skins" from "practical keys."

Types of Keys in Counter-Strike

Not all keys are created equal. For many years, Valve introduced numerous variations of keys tied to specific collections or occasions.

1. Requirement Case Keys

Acquired directly from the in-game shop for £ 2.50. These can open the huge majority of standard weapon cases currently dropping in the game.

2. Operation Keys

Throughout particular operations (like Operation Hydra, Breakout, or Wildfire), Valve launched operation-specific cases together with dedicated operation secrets. 3. Esport Keys

Presented early in CS: GO's life expectancy to assist fund prize pools for expert tournaments, Esport secrets opened Esport-specific green, blue, and red cases. These are extremely rare today.
