- **High Demand, Low Supply:** Skins that look amazing or come from popular developers can increase in value.

- **Low Demand, High Supply:** Over-printed or unpopular skins frequently offer for just a few cents.

Some rare and discontinued skins have actually attained famous status, with single items trading for hundreds-- or even thousands-- of dollars.
