4. Valve's Crackdowns

Valve, the designer of Counter-Strike, has consistently attempted to curb skin gambling. The company has issued extensive cease-and-desist letters to prominent gambling operators, withdrawn API keys utilized by automated betting bots, and implemented trade cooldowns (e.g., requiring traded items to remain in an inventory for 7 days) to disrupt the fluid movement of gambling properties.
