

Boston runs on schedules, street layouts, and tight windows. When you have a jobsite, a backyard event, or an emergency situation that needs to move fast, bathroom access becomes more than a convenience. 4. **Pickup timing and waste handling:** When does pickup happen after the rental end date?

Standard vs upgraded units, and when each makes sense
