





A healthy lawn can make an ordinary property look cared for, valuable, and inviting. It frames the house, softens hard edges, and gives children, pets, and guests a place to enjoy the yard. Others chew the blades down fast enough to make a lawn look scalped almost overnight. Burrowing pests

disrupt the soil and root zone, weakening the turf from below. Homeowners commonly mistake these symptoms for fungus, heat stress, fertilizer burn, pet damage, or poor watering habits.

That confusion is costly. A lawn under pest pressure can decline quickly, especially during hot weather when grass is already stressed. Preventive care usually costs less than repair
