3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.37 (Noticeable wear and tear)
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.37-- 0.44 (Significant wear on paint and edges)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Heavily harmed, sometimes changing the skin completely)

The Economy: Supply, Demand, and Discontinuation

The virtual economy surrounding weapon cases mirrors the genuine world. Valve categorizes cases into different drop swimming pools:

- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases presently dropping to gamers actively playing the video game.
- **Uncommon (Discontinued) Drop Pool:** Older cases that no longer drop regularly to active players. They drop at a very low rate (estimated under 1% chance per drop) to a tiny portion of players weekly.
