As illustrated above, the home or the RNG (Random Number Generator) dictates when a crash occurs. A round can crash quickly at 1.00 x, destroying anybody who did not respond in milliseconds.

Why Do Players Risk Their Skins?

The skin economy runs differently than fiat currency. To numerous players, a digital knife worth £ 300 feels less concrete than a £ 300 costs in their physical wallet. This abstraction of worth lowers the psychological barrier to gaming. In addition, skin crash websites provide several special functions:
