

Short Verdict: Hamilton or Burlington for Your Visit?

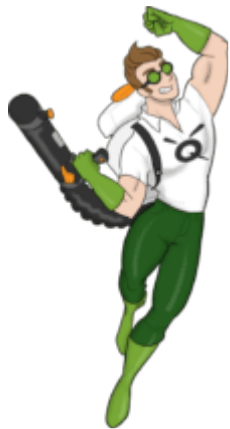
