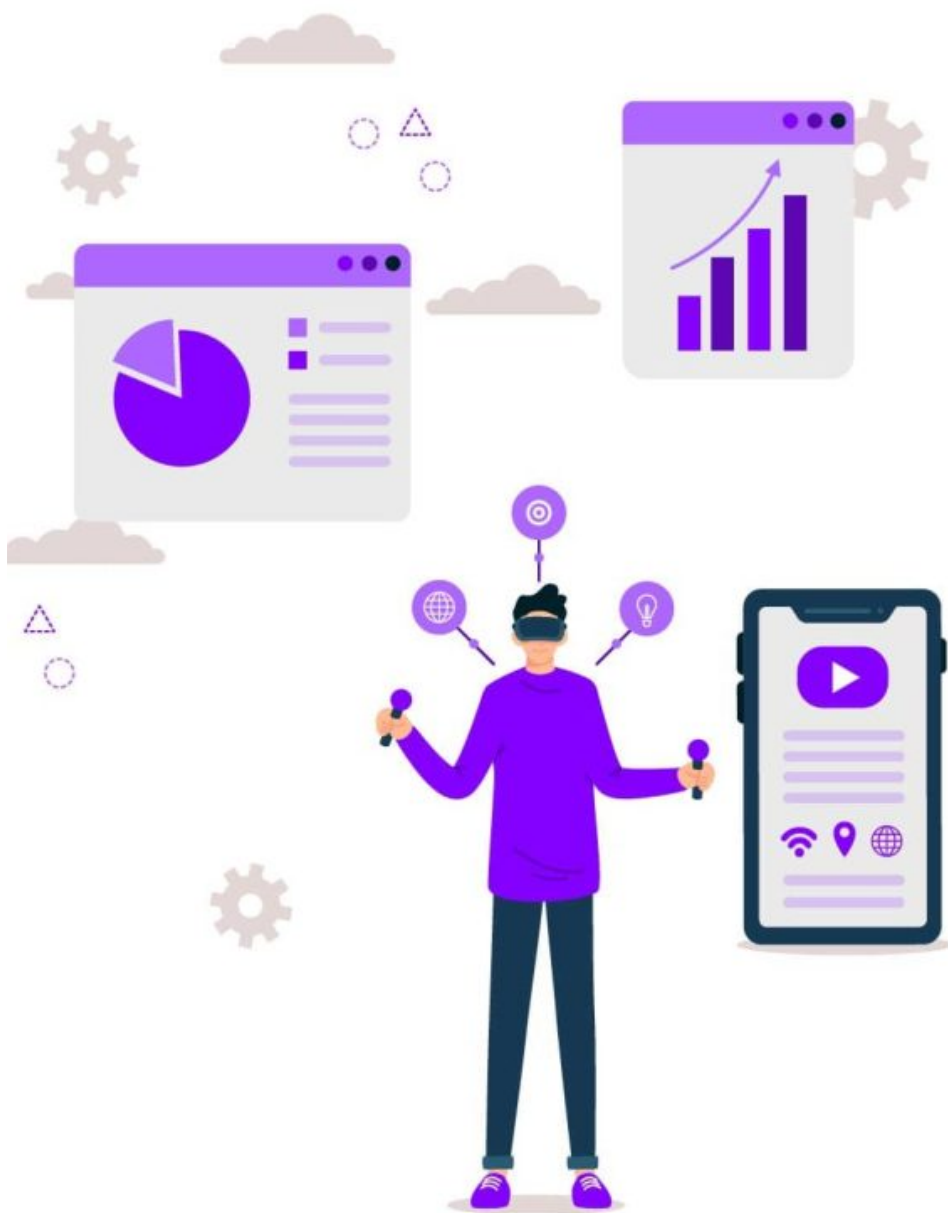


Why Fulton, NY Is Worth Visiting for Outdoor Recreation
