Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Substantial wear, heavy scratches, and significant paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Incredibly used, heavily faded, and often dramatically changed look. Some collectors specifically look for severe BS drifts for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond standard wear, some skins likewise include a **StatTrak™** technology module, which tracks the variety of kills a gamer gets with that particular weapon, including a glowing orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined
