Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Door Repairs

1. Repairing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is a simple fix, however a loose hinge needs a bit more attention.

1. **Find the concern:** Open and close the door slowly to pinpoint the problematic hinge.
2. **Tighten up screws:** Use a screwdriver to tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes have actually become removed, remove the screws, insert a little wood sliver (or a toothpick coated in wood glue) into the hole, and reinsert the screw for a tight grip.
3. **Oil:** If the door squeaks, use a few drops of lightweight maker oil, silicone spray, or petroleum jelly to the hinge pin. Clean away any excess.

2. Changing a Sticking Door

If a door rubs against the frame when closing, it is typically since the leading hinge is loose, causing the door to sag, or the wood has broadened.

1. **Check the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the top and middle hinges.
2. **Use the longer screw technique:** If tightening doesn't work, change one short screw on the frame side of the leading hinge with a 3-inch wood screw. Drive it deep into the framing stud to pull the whole door assembly back into positioning.

3. **Plane the edge:** If the door still sticks after changing the hinges, use a block airplane or a sander to shave down a tiny fraction of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.

Preventive Maintenance Tips

To extend the lifespan of your doors and decrease the need for unforeseen repairs, follow these basic preventive maintenance steps twice a year:

- **Check Weatherstripping:** Inspect outside doors every year for cracks, tears, or compression. Replace used strips to preserve home energy performance.
- **Keep Tracks Clean:** For sliding glass doors and pocket doors, vacuum out dust, hair, and particles from the tracks routinely. Lubricate tracks with a silicone-based spray (avoid sticky lubricants like grease, which attract dirt).
